



Commission Responsibilities

Launched under the Native American Economic Development Act of 1999 and permanently established by the 2007 Legislature, the State Tribal Economic Development Commission is administratively attached to the Montana Department of Commerce.

The commission is tasked with:

- Assisting to develop business enterprises on reservations;
- Identifying the availability of federal, state, and private sector funds for tribal governments, Indian business enterprises, and communities located on Indian reservations in Montana;
- Conducting a comprehensive assessment of economic conditions on each of the Indian reservations in the state;
- Applying for or assisting tribal governments in applying for grants listed in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance for which either the commission or the tribe are considered eligible and would supply tangible economic benefits to any or all Indian reservations in Montana; and
- Working cooperatively with tribal government officials, the Director of Indian Affairs, and appropriate state officials to help foster state-tribal cooperative agreements (Title 18, Chapter 11, part 1) that enhance the economic development on Indian reservations and to help the Department of Commerce fully implement and comply with the economic development provisions tasked to the Department of Commerce at MCA 90-1-105.

In carrying out the duties listed above, the Commission actively:

- Works with the tribal governments and the State of Montana to support, develop, and grow Indian-owned private sector businesses on Montana Indian reservations and across the state;
- Provides the Department of Commerce information and advice on investments of economic development funding in Indian Country;
- Consults with each tribal nation of the State Tribal Economic Development Commission and the State of Montana on avenues to improve the economic well-being of Indian citizens and businesses;
- Discusses and shares best practices in economic development that have been implemented by tribal governments in Montana; and
- Provides a venue for Indian people and tribal governments to learn about local, state and federal resources that are available for projects and activities in Indian Country.



Special Commission Projects for the Current Biennium

Montana Indian Language Preservation Program Transferred

During the 2021 legislative session, House Bill 671 transferred this program to the Office of Public Instruction (OPI) and is no longer under the management of the Office of Indian Country Economic Development (OICED) State Tribal Economic Development (STED) department within the Department of Commerce Business MT Division.

Strengthening State Tribal Economic Development Networks

Annually, the STED program manager and OICED staff travel to each of the reservations multiple times to address tribal councils, discuss projects with tribal staff and Indian businesses, and to share with the tribal communities the various funding and technical assistance opportunities that are offered through the state and beyond. Staff have participated in intra-agency meetings and economic development events including the Montana Economic Developers Association (MEDA) presentations, hosting regional Community Meetings with business partners from cities that neighbor tribal lands, Montana Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) panels, Governor's Conference on Tourism, and State Tribal Relations Interim Committee (STRIC) meetings.

As of May 20, 2022, the STED program manager position has been vacant, and recruitment of a replacement has been on-going. While this position has been vacant, other staff at OICED have been assisting with elements of the position's responsibilities to carry on STEDC meetings and further fostering of relationships with stakeholders and business partners in Montana's tribal communities.

Indian Country Economic Development (ICED) Funding

The Indian Country Economic Development (ICED) program, created by the 59th Montana State Legislature, is a State-funded program administered by the Montana Department of Commerce. Since October 2005, the State Legislature has made a restricted biennial appropriation of One-Time-Only (OTO) grant funds to be made available to Montana's tribal nations and tribal businesses for business development activities. In the 67th legislative session, \$1.75 M in funding for the ICED program was approved as part of House Bill 2 and signed into law by Governor Gianforte in May 2021.

The grants funded under the ICED program include the Tribal Business Planning Grant (TBPG), Indian Equity Fund Small Business Grant (IEF), Native American Business Advisors Grant (NABA), Tribal Tourism Grant (TTG), a Covid-Era pilot program in 2021, and a Tribal Tourism Digital Business Development Grant (TTDG).

TRIBAL BUSINESS PLANNING GRANT

The Tribal Business Planning Grant assists tribal governments and tribal organizations in deploying comprehensive business planning strategies and activities.

Fiscal year 2021, TBPG awarded \$30,000 each

- Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians: Three business and operations plans under the LSTE umbrella
- Northern Cheyenne: Development of proposed Workforce Training Center with studies in infrastructure planning; engineering, architecture, and environmental assessments
- Fort Belknap: NO GRANT AWARDED THIS CYCLE

Fiscal Year 2022, TBPG awarded \$30,000 each

- Blackfeet: Contractor fees to update land use plans with infrastructure analysis
- Chippewa Cree: Original contract amended to continue grocery store feasibility study
- Confederated Salish and Kootenai: Continuation of consulting on CSKT tribal transaction securities system and draft Universal Construction Codes (UCC)
- Crow: Feasibility study for grocery store with Plenty Doors Development Corporation
- Fort Peck: Tribal business incubator conceptualization and infrastructure study
- Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians: Development of Mobile Medical and Starlink business plans
- Northern Cheyenne: Business survey and plan completion with Peoples Partner for Community Development
- Fort Belknap: Small business incubator environmental assessment and impact study

As of July 2022, the Tribal Business Planning Grant is on hold and undergoing internal review. Preliminary metrics show only 32% of the awarded TBPG's go on to the next phase with fewer projects going on to completion.

INDIAN EQUITY FUND SMALL BUSINESS GRANT

The Indian Equity Fund Small Business Grant (IEF) assists start-up or expanding Native American businesses in Montana. Awards of \$11,000 to \$14,000 help with costs related to land purchases, building, equipment, assets, technology, operational costs, and sometimes working capital.

“The Indian Equity Fund has a proven record of successfully infusing capital into Native-owned small businesses in Montana,” said Department of Commerce Director Scott Osterman. **“In fact, 92 percent of recipients over the past five years are still operating and even expanding further.”**

In fiscal year 2022, IEF awarded a total of \$320,000 to the following 24 businesses:

Blackfeet Tribe

- Casey's RV Park in East Glacier will receive \$14,000 to extend electricity to the office and RV spots and to improve bathroom facilities.
- Glacier Elkhorn Cabins in Babb will receive \$14,000 to purchase lumber and other supplies to upgrade and add decks to the cabins.
- Sparkles Beauty Salon in Browning will receive \$12,000 to improve plumbing, electrical, drywall, flooring, and to add a covering to the porch entrance, as well as purchase signage and advertising.

Chippewa Cree Tribe

- Central Machine in Big Sandy will receive \$13,200 to purchase equipment, including a new hydraulic shear and a large toolbox.
- Double E in Box Elder will receive \$12,800 to help purchase a new mobile food trailer.
- Log Creations in Box Elder will receive \$14,000 to purchase a sawmill with a swing blade.

Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes

- All American Autoworks in Ronan will receive \$12,000 to purchase equipment, including an electric welder, plasma cutter, welding set, and other tools.
- Arrow Rock in Polson will receive \$14,000 to purchase a dump trailer with 10,000-lb capabilities.
- Hair to the Throne in Polson will receive \$14,000 to purchase equipment and supplies.

Crow Tribe

- Juiced Up in Crow Agency will receive \$14,000 to purchase a 16' x 26' trailer for a drive-up café.
- Real Bird Trail Rides in Garryowen will receive \$14,000 to purchase equipment and supplies.
- TruColors P&C in Havre will receive \$12,000 to purchase a new work truck and equipment.

Fort Belknap Tribe

- Crasco & Crasco Construction in Dodson will receive \$13,000 to purchase a side dump trailer.
- Marlin's Heating in Harlem will receive \$14,000 to purchase equipment, including a hydraulic liftgate.
- Rezolution in Harlem will receive \$13,000 to purchase a new camera and equipment.

Fort Peck Tribe

- 365 Design in Wolf Point will receive \$14,000 to purchase a new printer.
- Lien Windshield in Wolf Point will receive \$12,000 to build out a shop expansion to service multiple vehicles.
- RX Carwash in Wolf Point will receive \$14,000 to purchase equipment, supplies, and a new payment system.

Little Shell Tribe

- 406 Custom Auto in Havre will receive \$13,333.34 to purchase equipment and supplies, including a tinting plotter.
- Indian Paintbrush in East Glacier will receive \$13,333.33 to purchase a building and inventory.
- Plains Soul in Hardin will receive \$13,333.33 to purchase a 16' x 26' storefront building.

Northern Cheyenne Tribe

- Bark Park in Billings will receive \$14,000 to purchase and install artificial pet turf for its outdoor area.
- Hot Rock Healing in Lame Deer will receive \$14,000 to purchase a small cabin for services.
- Warrior Trail in Lame Deer will receive \$12,000 to purchase a storage unit for inventory.

NATIVE AMERICAN BUSINESS ADVISORS (NABA) GRANT

The Native American Business Advisors Grant is a fund to support the activities of Native American community-based organizations, tribal colleges, and tribal government organizations that support private sector business development on reservations and in tribal communities.

In fiscal years 2021-2022, the NABA grant awarded \$20,000 to each of the following organizations:

- Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians of Montana (Little Shell)

Tribal Tourism & Development:

Passed by the 65th Montana Legislature and signed into law by Governor Steve Bullock in May 2017, Senate Bill 309 created and funded an Indian tourism region in Montana. Additionally, it mandated the Governor-appointed Tourism Advisory Council (TAC) include at least two tribal members, one to represent tribal government and one to represent Native-owned private business.

Unlike Montana's other tourism regions defined by geography, the Indian tourism region is a statewide, noncontiguous region including all reservations as well as other locations significant to tribes with a modern or historical connection to Montana. The region is funded by 0.5% of the Lodging Facility Use Tax. The State Tribe Economic Development Commission (STEDC) approves the region's budget and activities.

As part of its commitment to tribal tourism, the Department of Commerce, Business MT OICED (formally Office of Tourism and Business Development (MOTBD)) created and separately funded a full-time Tribal Tourism Officer position to develop and implement strategies for tribal tourism development and promotion on behalf of the Indian tourism region.

In 2021, OICED partnered with Montana State Parks (FWP) and the Crow Tribal Heritage Preservation Officer, investing matching funds of \$50,000 from each agency to produce professional short films featuring Chief Plenty Coup State Park and the Pictograph Cave State Park on the Crow Reservation. Hoffman York was contracted to oversee the completion of the project in April 2022, and secured FilmWest for editing services. By late August 2022 the short films and cutdowns were finished and approved. These videos will be uploaded to the websites of Montana's Fish, Wildlife and Parks and VisitMT.com Indian Country Crow Tribe page, and additional promotion through respective social media channels.

Based on priorities identified through a joint meeting between STEDC and TAC in 2017, OICED contracted with Native writers and photographers to produce a tribal tourism guidebook titled "Montana: Explore Indian Country" featuring information about each tribe in Montana as well as three road trip itineraries covering the state. Taking inspiration from the "Seven Lodges Tribal Handbook" published in 2001 by the Montana Tribal Tourism Alliance, a new guidebook was created in March 2019 and then updated in March 2022 with new imagery and destinations.

The guidebook is distributed to visitor information centers and other tourism hubs across the state and can be ordered or downloaded from VisitMT.com. Despite production delays in the reprinting of the updated guidebook resulting in a back log of requests, between mid-June 2022 and mid-August 2022, over 11,000 copies had been shipped out to fulfill over 1,100 requests. "Explore Indian Country Guidebook" is the most requested guidebook featured on the VisitMT.com website since 2019.

Additionally, in fiscal year 2022, the OICED Tribal Tourism Office created an Indian Country Summer Events statewide marketing campaign, with the support of matching funds from Brand MT. Creative

content and ad placements were secured by Hoffman York, the contracted marketing agency on record with DOC. With \$160,000 invested from Business MT and Brand MT Divisions, buoyed by excess bed tax collections from 2021, the campaign highlighted at least one premiere event per tribal region for the summer season of 2022.

Ads launched in early June 2022 were featured on billboards and radio across the state, and on Facebook and Instagram, directing customers to VisitMT.com Indian Country pages for more information. Within the first 45 days of the campaign on social media over 9 million impressions were delivered, resulting in over 2 million visits to VisitMT.com Indian Country pages. Additionally, with the assistance of the Department of Commerce's Economic Analysis Department, cellular geo-tracking and card spend data collection points were set to capture additional metrics that will help to inform the economic success of the campaign. Results are anticipated at the end of September 2022.

TRIBAL TOURISM GRANT

The Tribal Tourism Grant (TTG) program has an approximate annual budget of \$118,000 and awards up to \$50,000 with a 50% match requirement to eligible Tribal Government self-identified tourism projects. These projects include destination or product development, infrastructure, marketing, or promotion.

In fiscal year 2022, TTG awarded:

TRIBAL TOURISM DIGITAL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT GRANT

The Tribal Tourism Digital Business Development Grant (TTDG) of 2021, a Covid-Era pilot program, was modeled after the Indian Equity Fund Grant program. The program assisted tribal governments and tribal member small business owners with funding for equipment, ecommerce, website development, and digital marketing when in-person tourism was prevented due to the pandemic. It was a competitive grant program to help Native American-owned businesses related to the tourism industry emerge from COVID-19 restrictions better positioned to generate revenue by establishing or strengthening digital distribution or promotion of their products and services. The TTDG was launched in 2021 in lieu of the TTG program. The budget of \$150,000 had a maximum grant award amount of \$5,000 to individuals, and \$18,750 allocated to each tribal government, and a 100% matching requirement.

TRIBAL TOURISM ENHANCEMENT GRANT

The Tribal Tourism Enhancement Grant (TTEG) of 2022 is a pilot program funded by 2021 excess Lodging Facility Use Tax collections. The TTEG program is a competitive grant program with no maximum award amount and no matching funds required. It encourages Montana’s tribal nations to submit portfolios of tourism projects, a ‘wish-list’ of their dream ideas to improve, enhance, or create long-term tourism offerings to their nations. The tourism projects must be shovel ready and long lasting. The goal of the program is to continue building upon memorable and safe tribal tourism offerings and to generate revenue through increases in visitor traffic and related purchases within the Tribal Nations of Montana and the neighboring rural communities.



In fiscal year 2022, Portfolio of projects awarded:

Blackfeet \$174,641.94

- 6 projects: Buffalo Calf Interpretive Center; 3 vault toilets to remote campgrounds at Buffalo Calf and Duck Lake; Interpretive-art installation, remote car and boat rental activity for visitors; 5 new Blackfeet style Tipi Lodges available for rent at the campgrounds; and a Buffalo Robe for display at the Center

Chippewa Cree Tribes of Rocky Boy's \$96,000

- 2 projects: CCT Buffalo Tour with spectator transport off-road vehicle CAM-AM purchase, new stadium PA System, electrical and lighting upgrades to the powwow grounds

Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians \$147,550

- 1 project: Hell Creek Recreation Area at Fort Peck near Jordan; heavy equipment and landscape maintenance vehicle purchases; facility repairs and replacements of essential campground amenities; and new fish cleaning station

Assiniboine and Sioux Tribes of Fort Peck \$194,484

- 3 projects: "Tatanka Omaskaskan" Buffalo Trail Enhancement Project; Rental Facility "Eco Lodge" at the Buffalo Ranch renovation; and Fort Peck's entrance upgrades with 10 new prominent flag poles and flags

Northern Cheyenne \$203,813.81

- 4 projects: Shade pavilion at Birney powwow grounds; memorial statues art installation; powwow arbor improvements at Muddy and Busby districts; and Crazy Heads Recreation Area improvements to roads, picnic areas, restrooms, and signage

Crow \$90,000

- 1 project: Apsáalooke Tours Expansion – purchase of two shuttle buses with wheelchair capacity or lift equipped, example: 2014 Startrans Senator 18-seater; development of content and printed materials, ticketing, and pamphlets for four tours: Battle Loop, Chief Pretty Eagle Point, Rosebud Battle, and Pictograph Cave & Chief Plenty Coups State Park

Confederated Salish and Kootenai \$200,000

- 3 projects: Elmo's Standing Arrow Pavilion structural and maintenance repairs; Blue Bay Campground dock repairs on Flathead Lake; and Arlee Dance and Games Pavilions recarpeting

Native American Collateral Support Program (NACS)

Following the 2015 legislative session, staff launched the Native American Collateral Support program after researching domestic high-performing collateral support programs. The program addresses a lack of access to capital for Native American owned businesses. The program has assisted with certificates of deposit to support:



- \$18,342 to support a loan of \$80,000 for the purchase of a hunting and fishing lodge for River Bend Lodge, LLC located on the Crow Reservation – 73% repaid
- \$72,000 to support a loan of \$144,000 for relocation costs for the Bloom Montessori School located in Helena, MT – 80% repaid
- \$70,500 to support a line of credit for the Family Health Pharmacy, Inc. of Ronan, MT – 67% repaid
- \$30,000 to support a loan of \$51,012 to purchase inventory for Sage and Oats Trading Post LLC in Helena, MT – 60% repaid
- \$100,000 to support a loan of \$550,000 to purchase the assets, including inventory, rolling stock, equipment, and machinery of Polson Auto Parts, Inc. in Polson, MT – 15% repaid
- \$100,000 to support a loan of \$400,000 for the purchase of CNC equipment for Polson Tile and Stone in Polson, MT – *new*
- \$100,000 to support a loan of \$288,450 to construct a meat processing facility and purchase equipment for Auggie’s Meat Processing located in Browning, MT – *new*

Policy/Program Recommendations

The STED Commission has actively participated in and made recommendations on the program framework and budget for programs housed in the Office of Indian Country Economic Development. A consistent focus for the commissioners is addressing the barriers of accessing capital for tribal and individually owned tribal member businesses and expanding the tribal private sector.

In January 2022 the STED Commission presented a Strategic Plan to the Commission which is meant to guide the Commission in future goals and objectives. A copy of the plan is attached as Appendix A.

STED Commission Board Membership

The commission is comprised of one member from each of the eight federally recognized tribes in Montana. Commission terms are 3 years. Upon expiration of a term a tribal government may advertise for individuals interested in serving on the commission and develop a list of applicants from which it may choose its nominee to recommend to the Governor. In place of choosing from a list of applicants, a tribal government may select an elected tribal official to recommend for membership on the Commission. If a tribal government nominates or otherwise recommends more than one person for membership on the Commission, the Governor shall select one individual from among those recommended persons. 
